A balance between biodiversity and development

In Trentino, safeguarding the natural environment and preserving biodiversity have long been priorities—benefitting both permanent residents and those just passing through. The unspoilt beauty of the province's landscapes are testament to an effort that stretches back generations, built on a long tradition of respect for the natural world.

From the World Heritage Site of the Dolomites, to the province's 297 lakes (with no fewer than 15 beaches which hold the prestigious European Blue Flag designation) to the numerous hamlets and towns awarded Orange Flags of excellence by the Italian Touring Club, Trentino today has a wealth of natural and cultural heritage.

The province's focus on environmental protection was evidenced by the creation the first ever regional or provincial natural parks in Italy—the Adamello-Brenta and the Paneveggio-Pale di San Martino. Alongside the pre-existing Stelvio National Park, which has been managed directly by the autonomous Provincial Authorities since 2016, they make up a vast and varied protected area. Over the past 30 years, these parks have been augmented by other protected areas, including: 75 provincial nature reserves and special habitats; 222 local reserves; 135 Sites of Community Importance (SCIs); 19 Special Protection Areas (SPAs); and numerous protected fluvial landscapes.

This Network of Protected Areas has made Trentino one of the most biodiverse regions in Europe. There are over 120 species of animal under protection in the province, according to the European Habitats Directive. By collaborating with local stakeholders, the Network of Protected Areas has also obtained the most stringent certification from the European Charter for Sustainable Tourism (ECST).

One of the reasons for Trentino's incredible biodiversity is the diversity of the landscapes within the province. You can go from the Mediterranean climate zone around Lake Garda to the majestic glacial environments of the Adamello-Brenta Nature Park in the space of a few short kilometres.

The variety and abundance of animals, plants and birds found



in these different climate zones is staggering. The province is rich in endemic species, especially in and around the Ledro Alps and Monte Baldo. Trentino is home to an estimated 36,000 roe deer, 12,000 red deer, 30,000 chamois, 400 ibex, and 90 brown bears. Wolves and the Eurasian lynx have recently made a comeback, and the province also provides habitat for as many as 70 nesting pairs of golden eagles, as well as bearded vultures and other rare bird species.

Altogether, protected areas now cover over 30 percent of Trentino's territory. They lie at the heart of a green tourism offering that helps achieve conservation goals by offering tourists the opportunity to experience these unique natural oases in a sustainable manner.

Thanks to a number of organised activities—such as guided tours throughout the year, environmental education initiatives, and sustainability workshops, aimed in particular at the local population and at younger guests—Trentino is fast becoming a leader in sustainable tourism. In the Biosphere Reserve of the Ledro Alps and Judicaria, for example, a wide swathe of territory which stretches from the Brenta Dolomites down to Lake Garda, sustainable tourism has become a key factor in growth.



Sustainability & accessibility

The delicate balance between human, nature and agricultural activities has always been at the centre of social and economic development in Trentino. Through the careful management of competing priorities it's been possible to transform the landscape for human needs while preserving the natural environment. One example of this is the dry-stone walls found from the Val di Cembra to Vallagarina, and from Valsugana to the Sarca Valley. The ancient craft of dry stonewalling, which has been carried out in the province for centuries, has now been recognised as an important contributor to the landscape. Trentino is big on renewable energy. The numerous hydroelectric power plants in the region yield a yearly average of 3.5 GWh of clean electricity, almost enough to cover the entire region's needs. The reservoirs which power them blend subtly into the environment and help sustain fish populations, tourism and water sports. The ski lifts in San Martino di Castrozza are all powered by clean hydroelectric energy, helping minimise their carbon emissions, and many ski areas in Trentino have invested in sustainable solutions for the production of artificial snow.

All of this is in keeping with the Provincial Strategy for Sustainable Development—a set of guidelines which lay out how the province will pursue green growth between now and 2030. The document sets out a plan for integrated territorial development: a model which ensures that urban, rural and mountain areas will all move forward. The plan aims to promote cohesion and reduce disparities, preventing imbalances and making sectoral policies more coherent. In the sustainable Trentino of the present and future, the balance between man and nature takes centre stage, and the resources and skills of the territory are orientated towards achieving fair and widespread well-being, supported by open and efficient local institutions and widespread innovation.

A further tool is the Environmental Energy Plan, which has the ambitious but achievable objective of reducing Co2 equivalent emissions by 55 percent of 1990 levels by 2030. There's also a Plan for Electric Mobility, which promotes the adoption of electric-powered vehicles, from bicycles to freight transport. Meanwhile, the bike-sharing project "Trentino e.motion" promotes public bike-sharing services, taking advantage of the 430-plus kilometres of dedicated cycleways which criss-cross the province. In 2017, the Trentino Film Fund and Commission launched T-Green Film, a range of instruments



and funds to help promote environmental sustainability not only in films but throughout the film-making process. T-Green Film represents the first regional fund in Europe that rewards and certifies eco-friendly film production.

You can see the many choices made with the aim of conserving the natural environment at every level of government in Trentino, but there are plenty of other initiatives involving tourist operators and tourists too.

Valsugana has become the first destination in Italy to obtain the certification for sustainable tourism according to the Global Sustainable Tourism Council (GSTC) criteria; and other local tourism boards are currently working in this direction to obtain the certification as well. Alpe Cimbra has developed specific initiatives in favour of young families with children and people with disabilities; Paganella and the Val di Sole have actively engaged local residents and tour operators alike in their project to promote sustainable development; San Martino is committed to using renewable energy, and Madonna di Campiglio is making changes that promote easier accessibility and more sustainable mobility.



TRENTINO OPEN

Around one billion people worldwide live with some form of disability. According to the World Health Organisation, this number will double by 2050. With the 'Trentino Open' project, we are committed to making the province's attractions as accessible as possible.

The project focusses on certifying accessible accommodation through the Open Label. It also offers support for the development of accessible tourism products and services, such as accessible guided tours of museums, or creating barrier-free trails. The project also promotes the availability of handbikes and joelette wheelchairs in summer, and sit-skis, with specialised ski instructors qualified to teach on them, in winter. Trentino's online and offline communication channels are also committed to addressing audiences with disabilities.

Trentino Open aims to ensure that skiing, climbing, cycling, trekking, and all of Trentino's many other attractions, are accessible to the broadest range of holidaymakers.



The Dolomites & World Heritage Sites


Emerging from the sea more than 200 million years ago, the Dolomite mountains, with their sheer cliffs, and jagged pinnacles of rock, are one of Earth's natural marvels. Visually stunning at any time of day, they are particularly spectacular at dawn or dusk, when the Alpenglow (or "Enrosadira," as it's known in Italian), makes it look like the rocks are on fire. Witness this optical phenomenon, and it's easy to see why these majestic peaks have captured the hearts and minds of poets, painters, travellers, and mountaineers for centuries.

In 2009, the Dolomites were declared a World Heritage Site, both for their aesthetic and natural value, and for their scientific importance, in terms of geology and geomorphology. The official designation applies to nine separate mountain groups, covering a total of 142,000 hectares. These are spread across five provinces in three Italian regions, making the site complex both in geographical and administrative terms. The province of Trentino is home to four of the nine World Heritage areas: the Brenta Group, which lies completely within the province, and the Latemar-Rosengarten group, the Marmolada, and the Pale di San Martino, all of which are shared with neighbouring provinces.

Trentino also boasts a second World Heritage attraction, in the Biosphere Reserve of the Ledro Alps and Judicaria. Furthermore, the Adamello-Brenta Nature Park has recently became part of the European and Global Network of Geoparks. These prestigious recognitions are testament to the rich and extraordinary natural and geological heritage of the province. The designations also speak to the longestablished relationship that man has established with nature in the area—one which focuses on respect, and a sustainable approach to the use of natural resources.

In 2011, the prehistoric pile dwellings of Ledro and Fiavè were also recognised as part of a larger World Heritage Site which includes 111 similar sites across the Alps. These sites contain the remains of well-preserved prehistoric houses built on stilts, and constructed between 5,000 and 500 B.C.

Rivers, lakes and water sports in Trentino

Trentino, with its **almost 300 lakes** dotting the land, is home to some of the most spectacular lakeside scenery in Italy. Besides the fantastic views, **water sports are also extremely popular.**


The upper reaches of **Lake Garda** in southern Trentino, with their mild climate, olive groves and picturesque lakeside towns, have always represented a first taste of the Mediterranean for visitors arriving from Germany and Central Europe through the Brenner Pass. Thanks to the prevailing "Ora" and "Peler" winds, Lake Garda has also become a hub for sailors and windsurfers with numerous schools and sailing clubs and dozens of international regattas organised every year.

Lake Ledro is located amongst the woods of the Val di Ledro, above Lake Garda. Renowned for its cool clear waters, it's the perfect spot for a refreshing swim or simply relaxing on one of its beaches. Windsurfing and canoeing are also practiced here. To compliment the scenery, it's possible to visit the remains of an impressive prehistoric pile-dwelling and associated museum. There are also numerous trails and mountain paths in the surrounding valley.

Lake Molveno, nestled between the Paganella Highlands and the Brenta Dolomites, is a real gem. Indeed, the lake was declared the "Most Beautiful Lake in Italy" for many years. Perfect for a relaxing holiday or for exploring the surrounding mountains.

The largest lake entirely within the Trentino territory is **Lake Caldonazzo** in the Valsugana. Its warm calm waters combined with accessible beaches make it ideal for bathing although water sports are regularly practiced here too with a number of lakeside establishments, including four sailing clubs, offering a wide range of activities.


Lake Levico, surrounded by a large park and verdant forest, is only a few minutes from Lake Caldonazzo and is renowned for its thermal resort. Ideal for bathing and a bit of relaxation either on the beach or walking along the lakeside trails.



In the south-west of Trentino, **Lake Idro**, with its steady prevailing winds, is ideal for kitesurfing while **Lake Tenno** offers the perfect backdrop for a picnic on its grassy banks, or a walk through the surrounding forests. In the upper Val di Mocheni, home to the Mocheno language and traditions, **Lake Erdemolo** lies in an amphitheatre of mountain peaks and is the ideal destination for scenic hikes.

Besides sailing, windsurfing and kayaking, Trentino offers many other water sports such as white water rafting along the **Noce river** and canyoning down the gullies just north of Lake Garda in the company of a professional guide.

The crystal waters of Trentino: angling and beyond

Fishing in Trentino isn't simply about casting your line into clear, calm, usually cold waters, rich in fish life. It's also a process of complete immersion in the natural setting of the Italian Alps. With its many lakes and over 3,000 kilometres of rivers and streams, Trentino is truly an angler's paradise.

According to recreational anglers, there are three main reasons for returning to Trentino every year.

First of all, there are the unique natural surroundings. From the rapid waters of the Chiese and Avisio torrents to the waters of the Sarca and Noce rivers, which hosted the 38th annual World Fly Fishing Championship, and the more tranquil waters of alpine lakes in the Dolomites, or larger lakes like Lake Garda. Secondly, there are the distances: the territory of Trentino, with its rivers, creeks, mountain lakes and waterfalls, offers anglers a wide range of aquatic environments to choose from, and all within short distances.

The third reason is linked to services and infrastructure: **about 80 fishing lodges** accommodate anglers and offer a range of complementary services. There are also numerous catch and release fishing reserves.

Furthermore, fishing licences can be acquired online and numerous Trentino Fishing Guides are at hand, ready to help. The higher mountain streams in Trentino are mainly populated by river trout and Arctic char. Further downstream, river trout is gradually replaced by marble trout and grayling. Almost all river species have also adapted to Trentino's numerous lakes. Arctic char is found in the high mountain lakes, the endemic carpione in Lake Garda and European whitefish, pike, and other species belonging to the Cyprinidae and Percidae families in the tranquil waters of the many of the region's lakes. The waters of Trentino are a unique and valued element of the region's identity. The rich biodiversity and pristine natural environments they offer have supported the development of sustainable tourism and the goal now is to turn Trentino into a leading fishing destination in Europe through its "Trentino Fishing Project". trentinofishing.it

Hop on your mountain bike and ride

Trentino offers numerous marked MTB trails and circuits, including 8 thrilling bike parks. There are routes for all levels including a range of family-friendly trails. Exploring the mountains of Trentino on two wheels has become a strategic asset for active holiday proposals.

The Network of Provincial MTB Routes includes over 330 mapped and numbered trails totalling over 8,000 kilometres. Other biking trails, though not yet included in the "Network", are nevertheless accessible. Restrictions, if any, are "targeted", i.e. they concern a limited number of trails, or sections thereof, where hazards have been identified.

Of course, trails are served by a range of facilities such as rental services, specialised accommodation, service centres, MTB guides and much more, not to mention the fantastic local food and wine! Here are the Top 5 MTB destinations in Trentino:





THE ALPE CIMBRA BIKE

A highland area with altitudes ranging from 800 to 1,900 metres a.s.l. characterised by meadows, coniferous forests, mountain peaks, spectacular views and the Lake Lavarone. There are trails suitable for everyone, in all disciplines, and a Bike Park in Lavarone with family-friendly trails. The Alpe Cimbra Bike district also offers 26 bike hotels and residences, 11 bike chalets, MTB instructors, and numerous "bike-friendly" services and events. Several lift facilities in the area remain open in summer.

THE DOLOMITI PAGANELLA BIKE AREA

Over 400 kilometres of marked routes, with easy trails suitable for families and cross-country and single-track trails (Intermediate - Expert) with a particular focus on trail/ all- mountain/enduro. There are also three Bike Parks and a number of Pump Tracks and Skill Areas in Molveno, Andalo and Fai della Paganella. Mapped trails, lift facilities, GPS tracks, rentals, bike hotels and numerous bike-friendly services are also available.



THE VAL DI FASSA BIKE AREA

The Val di Fassa has numerous proposals for MTB enthusiasts. Here we find the "Sellaronda Mountainbike", the best "off-road" tour of the Dolomites. It is a one-day tour and can be completed with or without a guide by purchasing the Bikepass Sellaronda. The descents are rather technical and mostly singletrack. For "gravity" enthusiasts the "Fassa Bike Resort" offers a number of trails at Belvedere of Canazei and Sellaronda Mtb Gravity with 20 km of descents. 29 dedicated "Bike Hotels" are also located in the valley.

VAL DI SOLE BIKELAND

The Val di Sole offers numerous quality routes, services and facilities for mountain bikers. There are over 1,000 kilometres of itineraries, 13 enduro all-mountain trails and 13 downhill trails, not to mention two Bike Parks and a Trial park.

The Ponte di Legno-Tonale Bike Park, the first Family Bike Park in Trentino, offers downhill and freeride tracks for all levels. A second Bike Park is located in Commezzadura. Its famous "Black Snake" trail has hosted Downhill Mountain Biking World Cup events. There's also a 4X Track.

The Vermiglio Trial Park, stage for the 2016 World Championships and a World Cup stage in 2018, has three sectors appreciated by keen Bike Trial fans.

There are Bike Parks for children in Pellizzano and Folgarida with Skill Parks and Pump Tracks for all.

GARDA TRENTINO BIKE

An extensive Bike Area with 44 mapped routes covering over 1,390 kilometres of trails. Trails are mostly accessible all year round and there's something for everyone. The Garda Trentino Bike Park offers some legendary downhill and freeride tracks and a shuttle bus service is available.

Not to be missed is the "Val del Diaol" trail, a 4.5-kilometre downhill track on Monte Baldo with some gradients exceeding 30%. The area also offers a network of 21 specialised hotels and accommodation catering for bikers.

Many lift facilities remain open from June to September and some, such as those in Paganella, from the end of May to mid-October and most also cater for bicycle transport. It's also possible to acquire tickets which cover a large number of lift facilities across Trentino such as the Skirama Summer Card and Dolomiti Supersummer Card. visittrentino.info/biking



Cycling and e-biking in Trentino

Since the 1990s, Trentino has been equipping itself with a network of now more than 450 kilometres of cycling-walking routes that cover the entire territory.

A network of **eleven cycleways links the Dolomites to the shores of Lake Garda,** bringing the delightful natural settings of the mountain valleys that bit closer to the cultivated lands of the Adige Valley and beyond. The backbone of this network, and the longest in Trentino, is a 100 km stretch of cycleway that runs along the Adige valley and links Bolzano to the plains of the Po Valley.

There are also **23 official uphill road itineraries,** many reaching legendary mountain passes in the Dolomites which have witnessed so many important moments in the history of cycling such as stages of the Giro d'Italia.

All cycle paths are well mapped and signposted with GPS tracks available for download and are, for the most part, suitable for families. For those who prefer the thrill of the descent, so-called "bici bus" (bike buses) and "bici +

treno" (bike train) services are available. To complete the offer there are around 20 Bike Stops (or "bici grill" in Italian) along the various cycle paths, offering food and refreshments, restrooms, bike rental services and of course direct road access. In the more popular tourist areas, e-bikes are also available for rent.

This is just a taste of what Trentino has to offer. The territory has long been at the forefront when it comes to cycling, with an excellent range of specific services and facilities, a complete range of cycleways, trails and itineraries suitable for recreational cycling, bicycle touring and, of course, mountain biking.

promote the use of eco-friendly mobility solutions. Since June 2014 the bike-sharing project "Trentino e.motion" has been in place. Electric bikes and charging points are available in the municipalities of Trento, Rovereto and Pergine Valsugana. Other areas in Trentino have been quick to follow the lead with bike-sharing projects in: Predazzo, Riva del Garda, Valsugana and Tesino, Primiero, the Cimbrian highlands, the Giudicarie, the highlands of the Paganella, the Val di Fiemme and the Val di Sole. Thanks to e-bikes and pedal-assisted bicycles, it is hoped to promote this form of transport to both residents and tourists as a new way to get around and explore the territory.

Hiking and other high-mountain adventures

Trentino has over five thousand kilometres of wellmanaged and clearly-marked trails and is a favourite destination for families, climbers and hiking enthusiasts with itineraries suitable for everyone.

The Dolomiti Brenta Trek, for example, offers two alternative ring routes from Madonna di Campiglio in the heart of the Adamello-Brenta Natural Park: the "Country" trail, which focuses more on the cultural and natural aspects of the surroundings and the "Expert" route, divided into 11 legs including stretches of via ferrata for experienced hikers.

Other spectacular routes include the **Pala Ronda Trek**, which takes you around the Pale di San Martino Group, and the **Dolomites Trek King**, suited for every hiker, leading from the Marmolada to the Catinaccio.


Furthermore, the Mountain Guides of Trentino offer the "Let's **Dolomites**" holiday packages, a range of themed 3-6 day treks with overnight stays in mountain huts. In winter, these excursions focus on activities such as snowshoeing, ski mountaineering and ice climbing.

There are over **140 mountain huts,** or "rifugi", in service in Trentino offering food and board for hikers on multi-day treks or anyone who wishes to pass by. Many are family-run and, especially those at lower altitudes, are easily accessible on foot and often offer tasty traditional local cuisine.

Trentino has **numerous via ferratas.** These are itineraries fitted with steel cables, ladders, walkways and other fixed climbing aids. Although many of these via ferratas can be completed in safety, it is often recommended to hire a local mountain guide. There are via ferratas for all tastes and and one of the most recent is the challenging yet spectacular via ferrata known as **"Ferrata delle Aquile"** in the Paganella and the fascinating **"Sentiero dei Fiori"** via ferrata, above Passo del Tonale in the Val di Sole, which follows old Austrian military trails.

Most ski lift and cable car facilities are open from June to September yet some, such as those in Paganella, from the end of May to mid-October. Daily, weekly or season tickets are available.

Music from on high: I Suoni delle Dolomiti

The Festival **"I Suoni delle Dolomiti"** (Sounds of the **Dolomites)** is a yearly **mountain music festival** with a difference, bringing together renowned international musicians and enthusiastic spectators for a series of outdoor concerts high up in the Dolomites.

Every year at the end of the summer, this unique festival offers a **rich and varied programme** covering a wide range of music genres and has become a widely-anticipated event amongst both musicians and music lovers.

Concerts take place high in the mountains and all venues are meticulously chosen for their stunning panoramas. Both performers and spectators alike must make their way up to the venues on foot, often together, which adds something special to the whole experience. Quite often there's a mountain hut or farmhouse near the venues for some refreshments. Some venues are serviced by nearby lift facilities or dirt roads making the concerts accessible to all.

The majority of concerts start in the early afternoon, just one performance takes place at dawn, a truly captivating way to welcome the new day and soak up the colours of sunrise from these heights.

The top event each year is a **multi-day-trek** where hikers follow, in the company of mountain guides, an itinerary of



concerts across some of the most spectacular mountain landscapes on the planet.

Detailed information on all concerts and venues can be found on the official website of the festival and on the official social media channels of the festival.

Mountain guides are available to accompany groups of concert-goers to some of the higher venues.

A Journey through Art

Castles, museums, palazzos, medieval hamlets and much more: framed by the majestic peaks of its unique mountains, Trentino opens its doors to its rich art and culture.

Buonconsiglio Castle – A comparison of architecture, history and styles

The monumental Buonconsiglio Castle in Trento was once the seat and symbol of power: the official residence of the prince-bishops of Trentino up to the 18th century. Here history is reflected in different artistic and architectural styles. From the imposing medieval keep to the gothic-venetian loggia and the Magno Palazzo dating from the renaissance period and the baroque Giunta Albertina. The halls have been frescoed and decorated by masters of the Italian renaissance whereas in the Torre dell'Aquila you can admire the "Cycle of the Months", an international gothic masterpiece. The castle also houses a magnificent museum collection.

MART - The court of 20th Century Art

The Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art in Rovereto, better known simply as MART, is housed in a striking building designed by Swiss architect Mario Botta and represents an international point of reference for contemporary figurative art along with the Civic Gallery in Trento. Among the exhibitions we find the Giovanardi Collection of Italian 20th century art and the Depero House of Futurist Art where the artist's works are exhibited in turn: paintings, sketches, cloth intarsias, graphics and toys.

CASTLES IN TRENTINO

Trentino is home to around 300 castles. Today, some still stand imposing and majestic, such as Buonconsiglio Castle in Trento, Castel Thun and Castel Valer in the Val di Non, and Castel Caldes in the Val di Sole. Others now lay in ruins. However, all reflect and narrate the rich history of this borderland hinged on its strategic position in the Alps, between the Mediterranean and central Europe. A precious land to be protected.

ELEVEN VILLAGES OFF THE BEATEN TRACK

Get away from the crowds and venture off the beaten track into one of Trentino's numerous hamlets and villages. Indulge in the delights of a leisurely stroll amongst barrel vaulted ceilings, wooden haylofts, and window boxes brimming with geraniums. Relish the sense of freedom that comes from breathing in clean air in natural surroundings. Embrace the joys of the little things: chat with the locals, sit around a table eating polenta, and look at the wonders all around you with childlike curiosity. Eleven different places in Trentino have been officially included on the list of the most beautiful hamlets in Italy by the "Borghi Più Belli d'Italia" Association.

The flavours of Trentino

Locanda Margon, Ravina, Trento. Chef Edoardo Fumagalli. Tucked away in the vineyards, it offers Michelin-starred cuisine and superb sparkling wines from the nearby Ferrari winery.

Senso Alfio Ghezzi at MART, Rovereto. Chef Alfio Ghezzi. A Michelin-starred restaurant with a prestigious location inside the Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art (MART).

Malga Panna, Moena. The chef Paul Donei won the coveted Michelin star in 1993, when he was only 19 years old, becoming the youngest starred chef in Italy. Fine cuisine inspired by the local territory.

EI Molin, Cavalese. Chef Alessandro Gilmozzi. Located in a renovated mill the cuisine reinterprets Trentino's culinary traditions and often uses unusual ingredients, such as lichens.

There are numerous hangouts, bars and restaurants where guests can enjoy an aperitif, perhaps a glass of Trentodoc spumante, or maybe order a platter of local cured meats and cheese before dinner.

Tasting Trentino: a journey through wines and vineyards

Trentino boasts a wide range of local products, from apples, vegetables and meats, to craft beers, fine wines and olive oil. Each local ingredient adds a unique flavour to every dish and guarantees a quality culinary experience.

The landscape of Trentino is cloaked in swathes of rolling vineyards. The variety of landscapes characterized by winemaking reflects in the variety of products it yields: indeed, the changing terroirs guarantee that the same wine takes on very different and unique nuances and character depending on the area of grape cultivation and in the space of just a few kilometres it's possible to find a wide variety of products.

This is why the wines of Trentino should be explored and experienced with calm and patience, reflecting the slow rhythm of maceration or fermentation, two processes required for wine production. Autumn is the best time of year, when the grape harvest is coming to a close and the warm colours of the changing season enhance the countryside, as the wine cellars prepare to collect grape must, the first step in winemaking.

In 1902, young Giulio Ferrari realized that Trentino, thanks to its particular pedo-climatic conditions, would be the ideal place for the production of wine according to the traditional method used in Champagne. He introduced it to Trentino, and in 1993, the sparkling wine "Trentodoc" became the first traditional method wine to obtain DOC status in Italy, and one of the first in the world. Trentodoc wine has since won numerous international awards, making it one of the most renowned traditional method sparkling wines.

The long wine-making tradition in Trentino has given rise to three native grape varieties: Nosiola, Marzemino and Teroldego Rotaliano. Many other grape varieties also grow exceptionally well in Trentino's favourable climate and soil. Trentino's climate and mountain pastures also lends itself to rich mountain pastures, ideal for grazing and thus the production of milk which is then transformed locally into highquality butter, cheese, and a range of other dairy products. visittrentino.info/en/articles/food-and-wine/trentinowines

Cycling through the vineyards On your bike along the 'Giro del Vino 50" circuit discover "the most beautiful vineyard garden in Europe"

A bike tour through a landscape of vineyards and hills, stopping off at wineries and distilleries. Sound good? First of all, you have to reach the Piana Rotaliana, not far north of Trento along the Adige valley, a place that journalist and geographer Cesare Battisti described as "the most beautiful vineyard garden in Europe".

Weaving its way through this rolling stretch of vineyards, you'll



find a cycling route that's not to be missed: known as the "Giro del Vino 50", this is a loop circuit of about 50 km in length, focused on the area's wine and food culture.

On your bike, you ride through vineyards and villages, stopping off at wine cellars and distilleries, or at any one of the hamlets you come across. Our advice is to devote a whole day to this tour, allowing yourself the time to soak up this unique experience of scents, sights and flavours.

This gentle ride through the vine-cloaked heart of Trentino, at the feet of the towering Paganella, is not easy to describe. It's a lot more than a simple itinerary, and aims to be experienced and enjoyed at one's own pace as it winds its way through the gentle and picturesque landscape in which cycling champions such as Gilberto Simoni and Francesco Moser grew up.

Discovering Rovereto and its wine culture by bike

Cycling through the vineyards of the "excellent Marzemino" praised by Mozart in his "Don Giovanni" opera.

The trail starts in Borgo Sacco and winds its way up from Isera through the countryside as far as the Sanctuary of Montalbano, a splendid panoramic terrace overlooking the town of Mori.

Thanks to the basalt soil characteristic of the area, the Marzemino grape variety has become the indigenous grape par excellence in Vallagarina. The vineyards can be found in the Ziresi area of Volano and in Isera. The resulting wine is not particularly structured, but still retains a certain finesse and elegance, making it known by the name of 'Gentle Marzemino'. Obtained from medium-large berry grapes rich in anthocyanins, it has an intense colour tending to purple and gives, both to the nose and to the palate, a fragrance of forest berries and an intense aroma of violets.



The northernmost extra virgin olive oil in the world


The northern tip of Lake Garda is the heartland of some of Italy's finest extra virgin olive oil.

Although at a relatively northern latitude, the climate here remains generally mild and temperate. In this Mediterranean microclimate, the mitigating influence of the expanse of water takes the edge off both the summer heat and the winter cold. We're above the 46th parallel, squeezed between Lake Garda and the Dolomites, at altitudes of between 70 and 850 metres above sea level.

This "Mediterranean" corner of Trentino is home to some thriving flora. The landscape is littered with oleanders and palm trees, cypresses, and vines. The olive trees yield an oil that takes pride of place in the kitchens of the finest chefs for its prized qualities: a vegetable-green colour with golden glints, a delicate fragrance with notes of almond and artichoke, and a smooth, fruity flavour that is rich yet light and balanced.

Valle di Cembra - Emblem of Heroic Viticulture

The Valle di Cembra, nestled in the mountains of Trentino in the Italian Alps, has been recognised by the Ministry of Agriculture as one of Italy's 'Historical Rural Landscapes' and entered in its official national register. The slopes of this picturesque valley are characterised by a rich tapestry of bold terraces, established and maintained with unwavering dedication since the 13th century. Today, these terraces, dedicated primarily to vineyards, yield a range of grape varieties such as Müller Thurgau, the refined Riesling, the gentle Schiava, the robust Lagrein, and the crisp Chardonnay, well-suited for crafting mountain sparkling wines. Additionally, it's a hub for the cultivation of apples, alongside a diverse array of fruit trees, such as peaches, plums, cherries, pears, and chestnuts, as well as various small berries, medicinal herbs, and vegetables. Symbolising the spirit of heroic viticulture and renowned for producing exceptional mountain wines, this region ranges in altitude from 200 metres near the banks of the Avisio up to heights of 900 metres. Its unique soil, composed mainly of porphyry, a volcanic stone of effusive origin, has been producing volcanic wines since the 4th century BC. This historical connection is evidenced by the discovery of a 'situla', an ancient bronze vessel used in wine production, at Doss Caslir in Cembra, establishing the Valle di Cembra as the earliest cradle of vine cultivation in Trentino.

Palazzo Roccabruna - The Provincial Wine House

The Provincial Wine House ('Enoteca provinciale del Trentino'), a showcase for Trentino wines, is housed in the magnificent Palazzo Roccabruna. This splendid building, a sixteenthcentury mansion just a stone's throw from Piazza Duomo in Trento, is the place to go to find out everything about the Province's rich wine heritage.


Established thanks to the commitment of the Chamber of Commerce to the local area, the main goal of this 'Enoteca' is to disseminate sound knowledge of Trentino wines combined with local food and traditions and to promote a more modern and critical approach to the world of wine.

The Provincial Wine House, therefore is certainly worth a visit for anyone passing through the city of Trento, home of TRENTODOC.




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Val di Non



The Dolomiti Paganella area is like a microcosm of Trentino much of the natural variety that makes the province so special can be found within the resort's surprisingly compact boundaries, and its various villages offer unforgettable experiences at any time of the year.

Just a few minutes from the motorway exit, visitors will find themselves in a strikingly wild landscape. The crystalline waters of Lake Molveno and Lake Nembia reflect the towering spires of the Brenta Dolomites to the west, while to the east, the Paganella massif offers hiking and mountain biking in summer, skiing in winter, and one of the best views in Trentino all year round.

The area boasts 400 km of marked bike trails, 50km of wide, sunny ski slopes and countless footpaths for hiking enthusiasts. There are also 40 children's play parks, and multiple farms and

themed footpaths for kids to explore. Foodies will delight at the range of options, with 125 restaurants and bars, 22 mountain huts, and 40 winemakers and specialist produce farmers in the area, while nature lovers will love the biodiversity. The area is home to 1,500 plant species, while up to 8,000 chamois live in the Adamello Brenta Nature Park.

In the Dolomiti Paganella area, you'll find one of the most beautiful old villages in Italy, a dedicated forest bathing area, a wildlife park, a large carnivore centre that's home to bears and wolves, and the distinctive vineyards of the Piana Rotaliana. The Dolomiti Paganella Tourist Agency was the first in Italy and among the first in Europe to become a Benefit Company, promoting not just the wealth and beauty of the local area, but also a new tourism model dedicated to sustainability and the wellbeing of resident communities.





Val di Fiemme e Val di Cembra



Located in the northeast of Trentino, the Val di Fiemme resort area is made up of eleven traditional villages. The valley itself is surrounded by two protected natural parks and offers stunning views of the Dolomites World Heritage Site. In winter, this well-known ski resort, with its wide range of accommodation and facilities, plays host to a whole series of international alpine and nordic skiing events. So far, three Nordic World Championships have taken place in Val di Fiemme and the resort will also be the venue for the Nordic ski events at the next Winter Olympics in 2026.

Fiemme is also known as "The Valley of Harmony". A quirk of geography means that the spruce trees which grow here are uniquely suited for building stringed instruments and pianos they were used by Stradivarius himself to make his famous violins, and are valued by internationally-renowned luthiers to this day. Fiemme is also the first valley to eco-certify its forests, which are carefully managed by a thousand-year -old institution: The Magnifica Comunità di Fiemme.

The valley offers endless possibilities for hikers and nature lovers, from treks in the wild, sparsely inhabited Lagorai mountains to walks among the Dolomite peaks of Latemar. Cyclists of all stripes will appreciate the huge network of marked cycle routes: from enduro mountain bike trails, to high alpine passes that will push even hardened road cyclists, to sedate, family-friendly cruises through the woods. The valley's extensive network of ski lifts makes it easy to reach higher altitudes, where cosy mountain huts welcome visitors with open arms.

Neighbouring Val di Cembra is also famous for its sports, with curling competitions at Palacurling Cembra. But it's particularly known for its food, drink and traditional delicacies. There are wine and food trails with "open huts", or Baite Aperte, and Caneve Aperte, or "open cellars" for wine-tasting.







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Valsugana and Lagorai



Nature | The lakes of the Valsugana offer breath-taking views over enchanting landscapes. Lake Caldonazzo, the largest lake entirely within Trentino, is the perfect destination for water sports enthusiasts; nearby Lake Levico is particularly charming, thanks to its beaches and picturesque shoreline framed by forests, perfect for kids. Both lakes have been awarded the European Blue Flag—a designation denoting water purity every year for the past nine years. The untouched beauty of the mountains is within easy reach: the Lagorai range, the largest mountain chain of Trentino, stretches out over 50 km on the northern side of the valley.

Bike holidays | An extensive network of over 300km of mountain bike trails runs from 2,000m above to level to the shores of lakes, at around 400m. The Valsugana cycleway

stretches for 80km along the course of the river Brenta, and is perfect for families, with refreshment points for cyclists, known as Bicigrills, along the way, and bike sharing services available.

Culture | Arte Sella is an open-air international exhibition of contemporary art with exhibits created using only natural materials—a place where art and nature combine. In the charming Valle dei Mòcheni an old German dialect is still widely spoken. Also known as the "enchanted valley" thanks to its magnificent scenery, the area offers trails through mountain meadows and woodlands at the feet of the 2,400m-high peaks of the eastern Lagorai mountains. Valsugana & Lagorai are only 15km from Trento, 100km from Verona and 150km from Venice: all of them can be visited for day trips, with good bus and train connections.





Rovereto, Vallagarina and Monte Baldo



Nestled among hills, castles and vineyards, Rovereto lies at the heart of the Adige river valley, along the main route linking Trento to Verona. Just a short drive from the Dolomites, and a stone's throw away from Lake Garda, the city and its surroundings are the perfect choice if you want to explore unusual itineraries, off the main tourist trail. Rovereto will amaze you with its internationally-renowned museums, which walk the line between tradition and the avant garde: MART (the Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art), The House of the renowned Futurist artist Fortunato Depero, the Museum of Science and Archaeology, the Italian War History Museum and the Bell of Peace are among the main attractions. Strolling through the old, Venetian town centre, you'll find art, history and science in equal proportions. In wintertime, the main squares are illuminated by Christmas markets, offering handicrafts and other delights from around the world. The Vallagarina area around Rovereto is a celebrated wine region that offers a range of fine wines and grappas. Marzemino and Moscato Giallo are among the most famous wines produced

in the area's evocative vineyards, but other varieties like Enantio or Casetta, ancient wines of which only traces remain in this area, are also worth exploring. Foodies will also love the cheeses and cured meats from nearby mountain farms, the organic vegetables from the Gresta Valley, and the locallyproduced honey, saffron, truffles and herbs. An extensive network of bike paths along the valley floor makes two wheeled exploration easy, while higher up, amid the panoramas of the surrounding Alps, there are numerous mountain bike trails, from easy-cruising blues to technical black runs. From the flower-covered plateau of Mount Baldo, known as the "garden of Europe", to the wild Lessinia Trentina, to Pasubio, rich in memories of the Great War, there are trails everywhere. In the winter season, the peaks of Vallagarina are covered in snow. The Brentonico plateau is the perfect place for family ski holidays, thanks to numerous attractions for children and one of the most popular ski schools in the Alps.



Trentino, home to great sporting events

Trentino's varied landscapes and impressive infrastructure lends itself to hosting a wide variety of different sporting events throughout the year, including some of the most prestigious competitions on the planet: from skiing World Cups to various events in the Winter Olympics itself.

The province also acts as the home base for various highprofile sports teams. The current Serie A Champions Napoli have been coming to the Val di Sole for over a decade, using the area as their all-important summer training base. In winter, the Norwegian Alpine Skiing team use the slopes of Paganella as a proving ground for their slalom squad, while the US Ski Team has its European home base in Alpe Cimbra. The Italian Alpine skiing team trains in Val di Fassa, while the Italian-cross country ski team is based around the corner, in Val di Fiemme.

Events:

- Our winter season kicks off with the 3Tre FIS Ski World Cup night slalom, held every December in in Madonna di Campiglio and the European Cup downhill skiing events in the towns of Pozza di Fassa, Andalo and Folgaria.
- December 2024 will also see the return of the Cyclocross World Cup to the lakes of San Leonardo, near Vermiglio in the Val di Sole. As the only Cyclo-cross World Cup circuit to be covered completely in snow, the Val di Sole track regularly attracts big names from across the cycling world, including Tom Pidcock, Mathieu Van der Poel, and Wout Van Aert.
- The Ciaspolada snowshoeing event takes place in the Val di Non.
- January will also see a whole host of cross country skiing events take place across Trentino, starting with the Tour de Ski at the Lago di Tesero Cross-Country Stadium in the Val di Fiemme, from January 6th to 7th. The competition includes a mass start contest—10km for women and 15km for men—as well as the greulling "Final Climb" up the Olimpia slope of Alpe Cermis, normally used for downhill skiing.
- Saturday 24th and Sunday 25th of February 2024 will

see the return of the Women's Alpine Skiing World Cup to the Val di Fassa, with two Super G events planned in the San Pellegrino ski area.

- Ski mountaineering will be contested for the first time at the next Winter Olympics. Trentino hosts several high profile events in the discipline, including the Sellaronda Ski Marathon, a night-time ski mountaineering race which takes place in Canazei, in Val di Fassa, on 22nd March 2024.
- With the arrival of spring, we have the first sailing and windsurf regattas on Lake Garda. The lake will host about 70 regattas between March and November with a total of 200 days of racing.
- In 2024, the northern part of Lake Garda, which sits within Trentino, will host the Youth Sailing World Championships—the most important event for World Sailing after the Olympics: over 900 participants, between competing athletes and support staff, across 11 youth disciplines.
- Cycling events also pick up in spring across the province. National and international races regularly take place in Trentino, including the Tour of the Alps and some stages of the Giro d'Italia.
- Trentino is also the land of mountain bikes. The International Lake Garda Marathon takes place on 12-14th April this year.
- Another cult event for MTB aficionados is the Bike Festival Garda Trentino that takes place at the end of April in Riva del Garda.
- In mid-June, the Val di Sole hosts the UCI MTB World Cup: a long weekend of competition with downhill, cross-country, and four-cross events.
- The Trentino Dolomites also host various mountain running events. Two of the most important are the Dolomites Sky Race, in the Val di Fassa, and the gruelling 64km Dolomiti di Brenta Trail above Molveno.
- After 25 consecutive finals on the Hawaiian island of Maui, the XTERRA Cross Triathlon finals moved to the shores of Lake Molveno, at the foot of the majestic Brenta Dolomites, in 2022. The area around Paganella has proved the ideal place for swimming, running, and cycling.
- In autumn, the provincial capital stages the Trento marathan and half marathon, as well the annual 'Festival dello Sport'. Taking place in mid-October, this event sees sports stars from all disciplines—from Reinhold Messner to Ronaldhino—give talks at venues across the city. Attendees are invited to participate in the various sports camps located in the city's squares.

Much of the Milan-Cortina Olympics and Paralympics will actually take place in Trentino. The province's deep-rooted sporting tradition and state-of-the-art facilities makes it an ideal place to hold events, and with the International Olympic Commitee increasingly focussed on sustainability and the post-Olympic legacy, using existing venues across northern Italy, rather than building new ones, makes sense—both from an environmental and a social point of view.

Trentino has already hosted the Winter Universiade, a multisport event for university athletes, and has big plans for the events it is hosting as part of the Five-Ringed Circus, aka 'the Greatest Show on Earth'.

Trentino on your doorstep

Trentino is served by a number of major coach and shuttle services.

"Fly Ski Shuttle" is an airport transfer service linking a number of participating localities in Trentino to most of the airports in Northern Italy (Verona, Venezia, Treviso, Milano-Bergamo, Milano-Linate, Milano-Malpensa, Bolzano). It runs from December to the end of March.


Pick-up and drop-off points in downtown Trento and the railways stations of Venice Mestre and Milano Centrale are



Skiing in Trentino: see the mountains in a different light

Trentino boasts an extensive network of pistes—nearly 800 km in total—served by more than 220 high-speed ski lifts. Most of the province's ski resorts fall under one of two, large umbrella ski areas: Dolomiti Superski, and the Skirama-Dolomiti-Adamello-Brenta area.

Snowboard: everyone on board

In Trentino, there's a wealth of snowboarding opportunities with numerous snowparks and events. Madonna di Campiglio-Folgarida-Marilleva hosted the ISF World Cup in 1999, featuring a new snowpark at Marilleva for pro-riders and SnowparX for beginners at Folgarida Malghet Aut. Other notable parks include Ursus Snowpark in Grostè, Brentapark in Pinzolo, and the Adamello Freestyle Arena and Serodine Snowpark in Passo Tonale.

Close to Trento, Monte Bondone offers a dedicated Snowpark & Halfpipe for snowboarders and freestyle skiers, including a park for children. Folgaria, Lavarone, and Luserna in Alpe Cimbra boast several snowparks, including the Prinze snowpark in Lavarone with the longest track in Trentino.

Dosson Snowpark on the Paganella features a practice area reachable by cable-car from Andalo-Doss Pelà. Val di Fassa Dolomites offers various snowparks, such as Dolomiti Park in Canazei and Ston8 in the Ciampac ski area. Passo San Pellegrino's Sanpe snowpark, recently renovated, offers music, refreshment areas, and lines for all levels.


Lusia's Snowpark-Boardercross attracts freestyle skiers and snowboarders, while Bellamonte's Morea snowpark prioritizes rider safety. The Pale di San Martino area features the Rolle Railz Park and San Martino Snowpark. Finally, Passo Brocon in Valsugana offers the Playground Snowpark, open even at night in Tesino.












The realm of Nordic skiing

Trentino has long been a favourite destination for **Nordic** skiing enthusiasts, providing excellent infrastructure and outstanding environments. Many important international events have been held in the Trentino mountains, such as the **Nordic World Ski Championships** held in Val di Fiemme for the third time in 2013.

Besides these great events, Trentino offers a wide range of other Nordic skiing destinations. In Val di Fiemme, Olympic Venue of the Milano Cortina 2026 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games, there are 80 km of trails on Passo Lavazè and in Val di Fassa there's the Alochet ski centre at Passo San Pellegrino. In Primiero at Passo Cereda and at Prà delle Nasse in San Martino di Castrozza there are a number of circuits of varying length and difficulty. The Alpe Cimbra features the Passo Coe cross-country centre with a variety of FISIapproved trails for national and international competitions not to mention the Millegrobbe di Lavarone ski centre. Viote del Bondone, above the city of Trento, offers a number of marked trails and in in Andalo, on the Altopiano della Paganella, crosscountry ski aficionados can find a number of thrilling trails. Lastly, in Val di Sole, the Vermiglio cross-country centre offers trails in the Adamello-Brenta Natural Park. These and many more centres can be accessed on a single Super Nordic Skipass, one single card bringing together 13 centres (10 in Trentino), for a total of about 1,100 km of trails between Trentino, Veneto and the Modena Apennines, creating the largest cross-country circuit in Italy.





Learn to ski and discover Trentino with our ski instructors

Trentino is home to a huge number of certified ski instructors, covering all snow disciplines and skill levels. There are 2,800 instructors in total, spread across 46 ski schools and centres: 2,122 specialise in alpine skiing, 169 in cross country, and 400 are specialist snowboard teachers. In addition, many instructors speak foreign languages and/or specialise in teaching children. There are also instructors who specialise in teaching niche advanced disciplines, including freeride skiing or freestyle.

Ski instructors are important, not just for beginners, or more advanced skiers wishing to improve their technique, but also for safety. Winter passes work in summertime too

Those who've purchased Dolomiti Superski passes during the winter season can use the same My Dolomiti Card, which they use to top up their skipasses, during the summer season.



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
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
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
